
The program gathers the most riveting Capa images: the soldier falling to his death in 1936 Spain, the Spanish citizenry in terror, a British family enduring the Blitz, the Normandy Coast on DDay in 1944.

Capa had gone in with the first soldiers on Omaha Beach, snapping historic images. But a nervous dark room assistant ruined most of the images. Only 11 survived.

Director Steven Spielberg modeled the D-Day sequence in Saving Private Ryan on the "chaos and madness" in Capa's photos.

"I'm only sad that the other 134 shots that were destroyed in the laboratory couldn't have been witnessed by the entire world because he probably got the greatest photo record of that invasion," Spielberg says.
